LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR AND ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR

The centerpiece of this report is our 25th Anniversary Commemoration and its related activities; we invite you to read about them here and browse them more fully on our website. This report also marks the return of our visiting KJC and Andrés Bello Chairs and the expansion of our Fridays on the Patio student-centered programming.

The breadth and scope of our programs took us from the transatlantic literary networks of the Spanish speaking world under the direction of KJC Chair Pura Fernández to the international feminist collectives of Latin America and Spain in the workshops organized by Andrés Bello Chair Verónica Gago. Each of these women brought to the KJCC a vibrancy, engagement, and dedication to their students and our publics that energized and challenged us - as well as reminding us that being together, sharing ideas, and having the space to reflect afterwards is what builds community not only around consensus but also debate.

The participation of students in our programs expanded and deepened during this period, from their participation on our Advisory Board and assistance with our events and programs, like the visit to the KJCC by US Ambassador to Spain and Andorra Julissa Reynoso, to the ideas they brought in building new connections with student clubs and community members across NYU and NYC. We are proud of our interns, undergrad and grad assistants, and our alums - all of whom remind us that one of our central pillars is to serve as a laboratory for the exploration of new ideas and different frameworks for learning and experiencing Spain and the Spanish speaking world in all of its dimensions.

The coming year will be marked by further transitions, but also continuities as we continue to bring in our visiting Chairs and our signature programs stand as anchors in the evolution of how we serve our cultural, institutional, and academic missions. Our Associate Director Laura Turégano will take on a new position as Special Projects Officer and we will bring on a new Assistant Director and Public Humanities Doctoral Fellow. We look forward to sharing these changes with you, so continue to follow us on social media and sign up for our Newsletter.

The campaign we launched with our Anniversary - "This Space is Yours" - continues and, as always, we welcome your presence and participation in our future activities.

Temporales Special Issue

The NYU MFA Program in Creative Writing in Spanish dedicated the May 2022 issue of the student-edited Temporales magazine to the double commemoration of KJCC's 25th anniversary and the 15th anniversary of CWS.

This special issue celebrated an art exhibition and a bilingual poetry reading inspired by the exhibition's pieces which took place in 2007. The show was called *The Geometry of Hope: Latin American Abstract Art from the Patricia Phelps de Cisneros Collection*, and was held at NYU's Grey Art Gallery (September 12- December 8, 2007), in conjunction with the Blanton Museum of Art in Texas. For the newly created MFA Program, this event, which formed part of the KJCC Poetry Reading Series, marked the beginning of its public programming.

The edition featured works of art by well-renowned artists like Gego, Lygia Pape, Judith Lauand, Alejandro Otero, Waldemar Cordeiro, Hélio Oiticica, Joaquín Torres García, Jesús Rafael Soto, Carlos Cruz-Diez, Raúl Lozza, and Alfredo Hlito; and poets like Coral Bracho, Cecilia Vicuña, Yolanda Pantin, Mariela Dreyfus, Jussara Salazar, Edwin Torres, and Roberto Echavarren.

Translations by Lori Cole, Forrest Gander, Mónica de la Torre, Rosa Alcalá, Eileen O'Connor, Urayoán Noel, and Odile Cisneros of the poems were included in the issue.

The issue also features interviews with Rubén Ríos Ávila, former MFA director, and Laura Turégano, KJCC's Associate Director, and a text by Edward Sullivan, former Dean of Humanities and now NYU's Institute of Fine Arts' Deputy Director. His essay, "The Geometry of Hope. – A Triumphant Exhibition at NYU's Grey Art Gallery," tells the story of the show and its influence at NYU and the US art world.

The MFA and the KJCC collaboration has always been one of creative effervescence and constant mutual support. In all these years, we have organized countless events, presenting talented authors from Latin America, the Caribbean, Spain, and the United States and promoting Spanish as a literary language in the US.


Esferas Special Issue

As a researcher at the National Council of Research (CONICET), she is also part of GIIF (Group for Feminist Research and Intervention). Gago is the author of Neoliberalism from Below: Popular Pragmatics and Baroque Economies (Duke University Press, 2017), Feminist International (Verso 2020), is co-author of A Feminist Reading of Debt, with Luci Cavallero (Pluto Press 2021), and of numerous articles published in journals and books

She was visiting professor and lecturer at different universities in the United Kingdom, Spain, Italy, United States, Germany, Chile, Brazil, Colombia, Perú, and México.

During her stay at KJCC in Spring 2023, she taught the graduate seminar "Prácticas feministas: tiempos y territorios de la revuelta" and curated the program "Prácticas feministas".

SCHOLAR-IN-RESIDENCE PROGRAM

Nick Jones (2021-2022)

Nick Jones (Yale University) is the author of the prize-winning book Staging Habla de Negros: Radical Performances of the African Diaspora in Early Modern Spain (Penn State University Press, May 2019) and co-editor of Early Modern Black Diaspora Studies: A Critical Anthology (Palgrave, December 2018) and Pornographic Sensibilities: Imagining Sex and the Visceral in Premodern and Early Modern Spanish Cultural Production (Routledge, January 2021) with Chad Leahy. Jones also co-edits the Routledge Critical Junctures in Global Early Modernities book series with Derrick Higginbotham and is the Editor-in-Chief of Caribbeana: The Journal of the Early Caribbean Society. Jones has held visiting appointments at Georgetown University and New York University and has published widely in journals such as Colonial Latin American Review, Hispanic Review, and University of Toronto Quarterly, among others.

Jones's residency charted and uncovered the conception, legacy, and porousness of Iberian Blackness—archival, performative, visual—across time (but primarily throughout early modernity). His residency culminated in a two-day conference supported by the National Endowment for the Humanities on how the Atlantic slave trade and resulting African diaspora shaped Iberia's "Golden Age" of theater, which was held at Yale University. During his residency, Jones participated in the el taller @ KJCC programs and was interviewed by Laura Keyt for periferias, the podcast.

Charles McDonald (2022-2023)

Charles A. McDonald was a Visiting Assistant Professor of Spanish and Portuguese and the 2022-2023 Scholar-in-Residence at KJCC. Dr. McDonald received his Ph.D. in anthropology and historical studies from the New School for Social Research (2019). He is currently finishing his first book, Return to Sepharad: Citizenship, Conversion, and the Politics of Repair, which is an experimental ethnography of the return of Jews and Judaism in contemporary Spain. His writing has appeared in journals including Comparative Studies in Society and History, Cultural Anthropology, and American Ethnologist. His most recent publication —a chapter on the ethics of refusal—can be found in the volume Reparative Citizenship for Sephardi Descendants: Returning to the Jewish Past in Spain and Portugal (2023), edited by Dalia Kandiyoti and Rina Benmayor. Before coming to NYU, McDonald held postdoctoral fellowships at Northwestern University and Rice University, and has been a visiting researcher at the Consejo Superior de Investigaciones Científicas (CSIC), Universidad Autónoma de Madrid, and the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona. Since 2015, he has been Managing Director of the Institute for Critical Social Inquiry (ICSI) at the New School.

At the KJCC, McDonald continued working on the politics of race, religion, and citizenship in Spain and the Sephardi Jewish diaspora. His residency highlighted the history and ongoing reception of Spain's 2015 Sephardi citizenship law in the Americas through collaborations with colleagues, public outreach, and student activities on campus. While in residence, he organized a Fridays on the Patio discussion with Robert Lubar (IFA) and Dalia Kandiyoti (College of Staten Island) on "Jewish Sephardic Diaspora in Spain."
